METHODOLOGY

Echelon Insights conducted a survey on behalf of the National Parents Union to examine voters' views — and in particular, parents of K-12 students' views — on current issues and policies. The survey was fielded online from October 1-7, 2024 in English among a sample of N=1,515 voters, with a base sample of 1,007 registered voters nationwide in the likely electorate and an additional oversample of 508 voters who are parents of K-12 students nationwide (achieving a total of 752 parents of K-12 students in the sample) using non-probability sampling. The sample was drawn from the Lucid sample exchange and matched to the L2 voter file to verify respondents' voter registration status.

Measures taken to ensure data quality included measures to prevent duplicate responses, questions designed to disqualify inattentive respondents, and the removal of respondents from the data file who answered more than one-third of the questions they were asked in less than one-third of the median response time per question.

The full sample was weighted to reflect modeled turnout and demographic characteristics of the population of voters in the 2024 likely electorate nationwide based on a probabilistic model that incorporates data from the US Census Bureau's American Community Survey and Current Population Survey Voting and Registration Supplement, as well as L2 voter file data. Weighting dimensions included gender, age, race/ethnicity, education, region, turnout probability, and party identification, as well as gender by age, race by education, and age by education.

Additionally, parents of K-12 students were weighted to population benchmarks for registered voters with children ages 6–17 (the closest population which benchmark data is available) in the United States derived from the U.S. Census Bureau's Current Population Survey Voting and Registration Supplement data on gender, age, race/ethnicity, education, and region, as well as gender by education.

The oversample of parents of K-12 students was weighted down to the proportion of parents of K-12 students in the base sample of voters in the likely electorate nationwide.

Calculated the way it would be for a random sample and adjusted to incorporate the effect of weighting, the margin of sampling error is ± 3.6 percentage points for the overall sample and ± 4.8 percentage points for parents of K-12 students.
